Local students relish CPC mission trips

Sixteen local high-school students went on week-long mission trips this summer.

"They made a difference not just in the lives of those they helped, but also in their own lives."

"I have always been passionate about helping others, but this trip was different," said Andrew Petersen, a Darien resident and Hinckley South junior. "The experience that we had are unforgettable."

"Although this trip was meant for the community, the relationships we made were amazing."

"The memories will forever shape me and change who I am as a person," said Cici Stank of Clarendon Hills, a Hinckley Central sophomore. "I am so grateful for this life-altering experience that I was blessed to be a part of."

Groups of high-school students traveled either to West Virginia to conduct building projects for underserved homes, or to Camp Courageous in Monticello, Iowa, to serve as assistant camp counselors for youth with special needs.

Groups of both trips were to undertake service work, all participants felt that they derived so much more from the experience than the homeowners or campers they were serving.



A Message From Our Pastor

This year has been filled with hope and gratitude. There has been so much momentum and energy that has been building throughout the year. We have much to celebrate and I hope we continue to give thanks to God for every blessing and opportunity!



Clearly the Holy Spirit is moving in this place. We began the year by re-organizing two staff positions and thereby reducing the budget by \$50,000. For several years, conversations and the five-year plans pointed to the need for decreasing budgets and what seemed like a real possibility: reducing the staffing model to one pastor. By mid-year, Session looked closely at the culture of CPC as a community that cares for each other and prioritizes faith ministry for youth and pastoral care and leadership for all. Session wanted to give the congregation every opportunity to weigh in on the priority of an Associate Pastor.

Our Stewardship campaign gathered momentum and generous pledges and joyful voices led to our goals being exceeded - we will continue to have two pastors. We celebrate with gratitude the way every corner of CPC has contributed to the whole. We thank folks who are continuing to pledge, those pledging for the first time, folks who have returned to pledging, and those who have significantly increased their financial commitment to the goal of offering the love and witness of Jesus Christ to our communities and world. While we absolutely love our brilliant and talented Pastor Susan, we are able to plan to continue the Associate Pastor role when she pursues her next calling.

We also express JOY for the high-quality music ministry among us. Dr. Christopher Cock joined the staff in January and has inspired the Chancel Choir and Bell Choir to share beautiful music in new ways. We are blessed to have his musical gifts and inspired to refine a musical sound under his leadership. Likewise, the Concert Series Committee was inspired to try a new thing: they added a family friendly concert with tremendous success. The Jim Gill concert in September brought new audience participants and sparked JOY and LAUGHTER with children and families!

Family of God, I see in you and through you the pure HOPE that is a life of faith! This year we have rediscovered the JOY of being together as witnessed in:

- Deacon Progressive Dinner
- All Church Christmas Brunch following the Christmas Pageant

They are committed to working each week in rehearsals, leading worship when invited, and sharing their music with joy and a commitment to the Gospel.

2023 Highlights

- Celebrated that the membership of both ensembles was consistent, averaging approximately 15 members in the Chancel Choir and 8 members in Clarion Bells
- Participated in Easter Sunday with a festive liturgy with both choirs and a guest brass quartet
- Convened the Summer Choir once each month (June - July - August) and we had a good choir assemble for each of those occasions
- Participated in outdoor Gospel worship, led by Shantée Lewis and her guest instrumentalists, and was a great success
- Enjoyed a variety of special music on various Sundays shared by Gregg Morton, Barbie Polus, Maura Janton Cock, Glenn Gabanski, Liz Monson and Ruth Karasek. Members of the Chancel Choir faithfully led hymns and worship from the Chancel when they were not singing a choir anthem.
- Presented a special music Advent Service on Dec 17th, joined by harp and three guest soloists
- Grateful that CPC is ably and wonderfully supported by the professional work of our keyboardist/church musician, Jason Hill

Looking forward to 2024

- Adjust to a hybrid working model when I will spend weekdays in Michigan teaching as a visiting professor at Alma College. Maura Janton Cock will lead the choir each Wednesday and we will work together each Sunday to lead the choirs and the worship life of CPC.
- Rise to our biggest challenge with our music ministry here at CPC – continuing to find enough members of the church who will participate. When members travel or are absent due to illness, it can put a lot of pressure on the process of rehearsal and leading worship. Having spent this year leading these groups, they are marvelous fellowships - communities who share a wonderful task and offer a supportive network for our church and to one another. - Presented on January 29 a beautifully played chamber music concert featuring the CHAI Collaborative Ensemble: 76 guests attended in person, 28 via livestream
- Presented on March 5 the Quarantet Wind Quintet featuring players from the Chicago Symphony and Lyric Opera orchestras: 77 guests attended in person, 21 via livestream
- Presented on September 24 our first ever family concert featuring the engaging Jim Gill: around 80 adults and children attended in Fellowship Hall

Over the past four years, CPC has invested in equipment to provide a quality worship experience for remote attendees as well as supporting the attendees in the Sanctuary. Each service requires 1-2 people who orchestrate up to 6 cameras, computer graphics (i.e. slides), pre-service music from Spotify, and 12-16 microphones.



2023 Highlights

- Transitioned to a team of volunteers who are trained and then work with more experienced volunteers. System operators alternate between audio and video jobs and volunteer monthly.
- Added the capability to view from the robotic camera on the screens in the Sanctuary. This allows in-person attendees a closer view during "Growing with God" or other portions of the service.
- Provided AV services to CPC's Concert Series Committee for use during concerts
- Offered livestream and recording services to those planning memorial services
- Created livestream recordings of worship and events and archived them on Vimeo

"The memories will forever shape me and change who I am as a person," said Cici Stanek of Clarendon Hills, a Hinsdale Central sophomore. "I am forever grateful for this life-altering experience that I was blessed to be

a part of."

Groups of high-school students traveled either to West Virginia to conduct building projects for struggling homeowners, or to Camp Courageous in Monicello, Iowa, to serve as assistant camp counselors for youth with special needs.

While the purpose of both trips was to undertake service work, all participants felt that they derived so much more from the experience than the homeowners or campers they were serving.



2023 Highlights

- Total income came in well higher than budget and total spending coming in a bit lower than budgeted
- Finished 2023 with a net surplus of about \$46,175 compared to a planned budget deficit of (\$85,343). This favorability was driven primarily by much higher plate/non pledge giving and higher than expected interest income
- Donations for Special Holiday Giving and Presbytery Offering/Per Capita income were very strong
- 2024 pledge drive EXCEEDED (!) the very aggressive goal of \$572,000, with a final pledge total of \$586,383. (Note that the 2024 CPC Budget approved by Session in December included a pledge total of \$583,383. Additional pledges were received after Session approval of the budget)

Note: This, combined with a continuing expectation of strong interest income and a planned increase in the Kids Academy cost sharing income, results in 2024 budgeted total income about 23% higher than the 2023 budgeted total income and about 4% higher than the 2023 actual total income. Inflation continues to drive increased costs for staffing, administration, and utilities, resulting in a projected 2024 surplus of about \$1,229. (Due to the additional pledges received after approval of the 2024 CPC Budget, the projected budget surplus for 2024 would be \$4,229.)

- Session approved the transfer of remaining undesignated funds in the Memorial and Gifts Fund (Memorial & Gifts Committee is a subcommittee of the Finance Committee) to the Legacy Endowment Fund
- Finance Committee intends to recommend that Session eliminate the M&G Committee and direct funds that would have traditionally flowed into that fund go into the Legacy Endowment fund instead






2023 Highlights

- Despite a volatile year for financial markets, reported a net effect increase in the value of the three Endowment funds of 19% to \$1,757,948.
- Received into the Legacy Fund the Memorial and Gifts balance of \$20,421. M&G responsibilities are being folded into the Endowment Fund Committee making the total value of the Legacy Fund \$52,172. The Legacy Fund made its first contribution to the General Fund, totaling \$753.
- Approved \$49,641 in distribution from the Endowment Fund for several projects, including:
 - New announcement screen in the Narthex
 - Replacement of an HVAC unit and associated duct and repair work
 - Replacement of landscaping and leveling and replacement of Memorial Garden pavers and the concrete sidewalk
 - Replacement of the back fence and the shed roof
 - Seal coating the north parking area
 - Replacement of the transformer in the fire safety system
- Distributed over \$2,600 from the BJ Wright Designated Fund to help fund CE-Y:
 - Fall kickoff event
 - Midyear event
- Provided nearly \$5,000 in funding from the BJ Wright Designated Fund to pay for summer interns, Robert Monson and Tristan Rush
- Updated the Endowment Fund and Tree of Life brochures
- Visited seven families to explain the new Legacy Fund and answer questions regarding bequests to CPC

The Presbytery of Chicago serves and supports nearly 40,000 members and more than 100 congregations and worshiping fellowships throughout Chicago and the surrounding area. They are a Christian community and a regional governing body of the Presbyterian Church (USA).

The Assembly consists of the clergy members of the Presbytery of Chicago and an approximately equal number of elders who are commissioners and other elder members. The purpose of the Presbytery Assembly is to oversee the mission and governance of the Presbytery of Chicago. The Presbytery Assembly gathers in stated meetings four times a year and whenever called into special session.

- Met in person for the first time since February 2020 for our May meeting. The schedule is to meet in person in May and September and virtually in February and November.
- Recognized Craig Howard as the Executive Presbyter. This year the Assembly approved Reverend Dr. Barbara Wilson as Associate Executive Presbyter.
- Proud that several members of CPC sit on various Presbytery committees
- Welcomed several new pastors to the Presbytery. An important responsibility of the Assembly is to examine those who have received a first call and to approve that they be ordained and installed.
